Panmure's Twin Cultivation Art Installation

Anmure's Train Station recently saw a temporary art installation called Twin Cultivation which was kindly funded by Eke Panuku. It brought together ceramic artist Cindy Huang, designer Micheal McCabe, and producer Rosabel Tan. Presented as a miniature garden, the installation saw members of the public signing up for a 'harvesting' session. Two strangers entered the 'garden' together, and were invited to unearth a ceramic vegetable to gift to the other person to take home. Cindy's work builds on interest in the relationships that Chinese migrant communities can and could have as tangata tiriti, and seek to collectively consider the histories of the land, the many people who share this city, and the possible futures created.

The title, Twin Cultivation, is a nod to the idea of companion planting: the idea that different plants grow stronger together than apart. Through each harvesting session, the installation created unexpected collisions: conversations that might not have happened otherwise, the discovery of shared histories, and a variety of keepsakes across Tāmaki Makaurau.

In total, 120 hand-made works were gifted in Panmure. As part of the focus on art in Panmure, the PBA supported the event by providing vouchers for random participants, to ensure visitors returned to Panmure to shop and eat.

In our last newsletter, you will have seen we were partnering with a company called Lazy Susan. They recently carried out a fantastic promotional campaign for some of the food businesses of Panmure. With a following of almost 29,000 food lovers on Facebook, the relationship with Lazy Susan was a no-brainer and we knew they would help spread the word of the fantastic dining options here in the Town Centre. The online marketing was shared far and wide with people that take their food options very seriously, so it was a successful campaign from our perspective. I would like to thank the local Maungakiekie-Tamaki board for assisting in funding this project.

Panmure's Swing Bridge Project



e have an update from the AT Construction Delivery Team on the Panmure Swing Bridge project. The aim of this project is to uncover and protect the section of the original Panmure bridge span built circa 1866 and enable the public to view the designated heritage site structure.

The proposed works include building a viewing platform above the swing span. Projecting over the Tamaki River will create a lovely attraction. Following demolition of the marina building, there will be a conservation process to protect the historic elements. A steel structure will provide support for the bridge span and new viewing deck; timber piling will provide support for a new board walk being constructed to afford access to the bridge. Planting and landscaping will make the area a wonderful place to visit.

The proposed finishing date is mid-2023, so watch this space!
